Maternal Health: Breaking Barriers: Maternal Mental Health and Substance Misuse in the Postpartum Period

Presenter: Rhonda Williams, MD, MPH, MSc - East Tennessee State University

This session will discuss the impact of maternal mental health during the postpartum period for women with substance misuse disorders or histories of substance misuse, using the Levesque Framework's five dimensions of access: approachability, acceptability, availability, affordability and appropriateness.

Lastly, presenters will discuss a proven blueprint of what and how communities can effectively address these issues collaboratively.

School Health: Supporting Cross-District Learning and Innovation in School-Based Mental Health Services

Maternal Health: Optimizing the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Workflow with Asana: A Seamless Approach to Application & Reporting

Presenters: Elizabeth King, MS and Mary Ellen "Emmie" Gorman MPH, MS - Tennessee Department of Health

The Tennessee Department of Health improved MCH Block Grant management by adopting Asana, replacing inefficient Excel-based coordination. Asana streamlined task tracking, improved communication and enhanced collaboration among 218 staff and partners. This led to 98% deadlines being met and a 20% increase in productivity. Despite initial resistance, training and support ensured successful adoption. The project showcases how digital tools can boost public health grant efficiency and offers a replicable model for future use.

- Ensure timely completion of grant deliverables by streamlining task tracking and accountability
- Establish a replicable digital system to manage future grant cycles more efficiently

Mental/Behavioral Health: The Triple Whammy for Rural Communities - Substance Use Disorder, Behavioral Health and Stigma

Presenters: Robert Merritt MSN, RN and Rebecca Lagan - Myrtle Recovery Centers, Inc

Living in rural communities can have substantial benefits; however, there are also significant challenges, particularly if you or a loved one is living with a substance use disorder and a co-occurring behavioral health condition. There is a very strong correlation between substance use disorders and behavioral health issues, making it difficult to find a treatment location equipped to address both conditions simultaneously. Often, there is a considerable distance between their home and the nearest treatment facility. Additionally, the stigma surrounding behavioral health and substance use can be greater in rural communities.

These factors, combined with limited access to comprehensive treatment options, greatly reduce the ability of rural patients to receive effective harm reduction services and contribute to higher rates of overdose and substance use in rural Tennessee.

Objectives:

- Discuss cultural, social and economic factors that contribute to stigma in rural areas
- Examine the real-world effects on the rural population experiencing difficulty accessing treatment, including barriers to seeking help, isolation and increased suicide rates
- Share strategies for reducing stigma, including community-based initiatives, policy changes and personal advocacy

School Health: Dodging the Pitchforks and Torches: Teaching Family Life Education in Rural Tennessee

Presenter: Adam Pollock and Whitney Salyer, B.A. - Centerstone

Teaching teen pregnancy prevention in Tennessee schools is hard. The Tennessee Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Education and Support program (TCAPES) is designed to strengthen the integration of mental health care within pediatric primary care settings. By supporting pediatric providers, TCAPES helps address the growing behavioral health needs of children and adolescents, while also responding to the critical shortage of mental health professionals across Tennessee. This initiative is funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA).




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
